Its strong, female protagonist, Katniss Everdeen, fights against systems of oppression, making this story both engaging and relevant to historic and contemporary struggles for justice.

One of my favorite books at the TRC is *Echo* by Pam Muñoz Ryan. A fictional book that centers around three kids from different cultures as they try to navigate growing up in the turbulent times of World War II. One thing ties them all together: a magical harmonica that will help them on their journeys. A moving story of hope, faith and perspective, this novel teaches that we must overlook racial and cultural differences to see what we truly are: the same.
